The Undertaking:	(i) Nature of Undertaking		
	Timber harvesting amendment to the Five-Year Operating Plan for Forest Management District 18.		
	(ii) Purpose/Rationale/Need for Undertaking		
	The purpose for this timber harvesting amendment is twofold. Firstly, the Camp 20 Operating Area has experienced moderate to severe insect damage over the past two years. This has resulted in varying degrees of mortality in the timber stands in this area. In an effort to salvage this timber, the Department will require an amendment to the current five year operating plan. The majority of mature timber remaining in this area is fringes from previous harvesting operations, class III or partition timber. This timber is isolated by wet ground and can only be accessed by winter roads. Therefore, no new permanent access roads are planned to harvest this		

timber. Secondly, in the recent provincial budget (2002-2003), additional funding was allocated to access class III timber stands. While an Annual Allowable Cut was calculated for this timber, it could not be harvested due to a lack of access. This additional funding will now provide access to class III timber in the Ocean Pond Operating Area which was previously classed as inaccessible.

#### **Description of Undertaking**:

(i) Geographic Location

Forest Management District 18 is roughly the northern half of the Great Northern Peninsula. This harvesting amendment covers two operating areas. The Camp 20 Operating Area is approximately nine kilometres northwest from the community of Main Brook. The Ocean Pond Operating Area is in the middle of the Northern Peninsula, approximately twenty-seven kilometres west from the community of Main Brook. The attached 1:50 000 topographic map and 1:25 000 stand type maps outline the general and exact locations.

(ii) Physical Features

The Camp20 amendment covers 133 hectares and includes harvesting 9,897 m<sup>3</sup> of merchantable softwood volume. The Ocean Pond amendment covers 91 hectares and includes construction of 3.7 kilometres of forest access road, and the harvesting of 6,720 m<sup>3</sup> of merchantable volume.

(iii)Operation

This is an integrated sawlog/pulpwood operation. The timber will be harvested with a mechanical harvester and extracted by forwarders. This operation will create approximately <u>191</u> direct person-weeks of employment in the road construction, harvesting, forwarding and trucking of timber. Approximately another <u>560</u> person weeks of employment will be created through secondary manufacturing of newsprint and sawn lumber.

Commercial harvesting is subject to the regulations laid out by the Forestry Act and other related legislation. As well, operating permits are subject to

While there will be no visual impact to this operation, it will allow local residents better access to animals within walking distance of this lodge. I have spoken to Mr. Aster Caines (Big Game Outfitter) on a couple of occasions and we have agreed upon the following conditions: <ol> <li>The road will be closed to light vehicle traffic during the big game hunting season.</li> <li>There will be no harvesting in this area after the end of August.</li> <li>This road will be deactivated once harvesting operations are finished.</li> <li>The Department will leave two 50m X 50m blocks of timber in locations to be determined by the outfitter for tree stand areas.</li> </ol> </li> </ul>
