# CHAIRPERSON'S MESSAGE

---

The Regional Planning Authority (the Authority) for the Labrador Inuit Settlement Area (LISA) was appointed jointly by the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador and the Nunatsiavut Government in April 2007. Under the Labrador Inuit Land Claims Agreement (the Agreement), its role is to direct the preparation of a Regional Land Use Plan for LISA (including Labrador Inuit Lands) for the consideration of both governments.

It is comprised of four members: Ms. Isabella Pain and Mr. Keith Chaulk nominated by the Nunatsiavut Government and Ms. Mary Bishop and Mr. Stan Clinton nominated by the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador. At its first meeting the Authority, as is required by the Agreement, chose a chair from amongst its members.

It was with regret that the Authority learned that Keith Chaulk resigned as a member of the Authority. The resignation became effective on February 6, 2009. The Nunatsiavut Government commenced the process to nominate someone to fill the vacancy left by the resignation.


The Regional Planning Authority is categorized as a category 3 entity under the Province's Transparency and Accountability legislation, and is required to plan and report accordingly. In addition to this legislated requirement, the Authority liaises with staff of both the Province and the Nunatsiavut Government, some of whom attend Authority meetings from time to time. All parties are kept apprised of the Authority's activities.

The Authority's actions in having a Regional Land Use Plan drafted will contribute to two of the Provincial Government's strategic directions: Aboriginal Relations, and Strengthening Municipal Capacity. For the Department of Labrador and Aboriginal Affairs this means the establishment of effective working relationships with Aboriginal peoples through the implementation of the Labrador Inuit Land Claims Agreement which includes the preparation of a Regional Land Use Plan. For the Department of Municipal Affairs this means Strengthening Municipal Capacity with the preparation of regional land use plans.

This report documents the Authority's performance during the first year of its 2008-11 Activity Plan. The Authority fully met its 2008-09 objective to establish the goals and objectives for the Land Use Plan. The Authority also prepared a Performance Report for 2007-08 which covered the start up phase with respect to the Authority's 2007-08 Transitional Plan pending the preparation of the Activity Plan for 2008-11.

All Authority members have participated in the preparation of this document, will participate in the Authority's activities towards the future preparation of the Regional Land Use Plan, and will have an equal say in the Authority's final deliberations prior to the submission of the Plan to both governments. The members of the Regional Planning Authority for the Labrador Inuit Settlement Area are accountable for the results reported in the 2008-09 Activity Report.

Labrador Inuit call the Labrador Inuit Settlement Area "Nunatsiavut" which means "our beautiful land". The Authority aims to prepare a plan for the wise use of this beautiful land.

## 1.0 OVERVIEW

---

Pursuant to section 10.3.1 of the Labrador Inuit Land Claims Agreement, the Government and Newfoundland and Labrador and the Nunatsiavut Government jointly appointed the Regional Planning Authority for the Labrador Inuit Settlement Area composed of four members having knowledge and experience in land use planning. The members were jointly appointed in April 2007. The members of the Authority selected a chair from amongst the members.

Funding for the Authority is provided jointly by both governments.

## 2.0 MANDATE

---

The Labrador Inuit Lands Claim Agreement Act brought the Agreement into legal effect.

Section 10.3.8 of the Agreement states that:

*"The Regional Planning Authority shall prepare a single, comprehensive Land Use Plan for the Labrador Inuit Settlement Area following the procedures set out for the preparation of a regional plan by a regional authority under the Urban and Rural Planning Act, 2000, as modified by this chapter, and for that purpose has the powers and shall carry out the functions of a regional authority under the Urban and Rural Planning Act, 2000, subject to this chapter."*



## 3.0 VALUES

---

The Authority has the following values:

Collaboration	Each member seeks the knowledge and opinions of others when directing the preparation of the regional plan.
Commitment	Each member ensures effective representation of both governments and the Labrador Inuit.
Integrity	Each member represents the interests of both governments and the Labrador Inuit in a flexible, thorough and open manner within his/her mandate.
Respect	Each member acts based on the needs and culture of both governments and the Labrador Inuit in the spirit of the Agreement.

## 4.0 PRIMARY CLIENTS

---

The primary clients of the Authority are the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador, the Nunatsiavut Government, the Labrador Inuit, other aboriginal people, residents and stakeholders in the Labrador Inuit Settlement Area including Labrador Inuit Lands.

## 5.0 VISION

---

A Regional Land Use Plan for the Labrador Inuit Settlement Area, including Labrador Inuit Lands, respecting the environment, cultural factors and priorities and the rights of the Labrador Inuit having been prepared to:

- guide the use of land, water and natural resources; and
- optimize social, cultural and economic benefits for the Labrador Inuit and other residents of the Labrador Inuit Settlement Area.

## 6.0 MISSION

---

The focus of the Authority is to draft a regional plan for the Labrador Inuit Settlement Area as required by the Agreement and the Urban and Rural Planning Act, 2000.

**Mission:** By 2011, the Authority will have prepared a draft regional plan.

**Measure:** Draft regional plan prepared

**Indicators:**

- Number of Authority meetings
- Numbers of stakeholders consulted
- Planner recruited
- Commissioner appointed
- Number of public meetings
- Facilitated and coordinated meetings with other boards established under the Agreement
- Consulted with Provincial Government and Nunatsiavut Government

## 7.0 ACTIVITIES

### Issue: Regional Planning Authority Operation

The Authority was jointly appointed in April 2007. The Authority is responsible for the preparation of a Regional Land Use Plan for the Labrador Inuit Settlement Area. It is responsible for the oversight of the Regional Planner and holding meetings with government representatives and stakeholder groups. The goals have been prepared in consultation with the Authority members.

The Authority's actions in having a Regional Land Use Plan drafted will contribute to two of the Provincial Government's strategic directions: Aboriginal Relations, and Strengthening Municipal Capacity. For the Department of Labrador and Aboriginal Affairs this means the establishment of effective working relationships with Aboriginal peoples through the implementation of the Labrador Inuit Land Claims Agreement which includes the preparation of a Regional Land Use Plan. For the Department of Municipal Affairs this means Strengthening Municipal Capacity with the preparation of regional land use plans.

**Goal:** By March 31, 2011, the Authority, with the assistance of the Regional Planner, will have submitted a final draft of the Regional Land Use Plan for the LISA to the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador and the Nunatsiavut Government.

**Measure:** Submitted the final draft of the Regional Land Use Plan.

**Indicators:** Submitted the final draft of the Regional Land Use Plan to the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador and the Nunatsiavut Government.

#### Objective 1

By March 31, 2009 the Authority with the assistance of the Regional Planner will have established Goals and Objectives for the Land Use Plan.

**Measure:** Established the Goals and Objectives for the Regional Land Use Plan.

Indicators	Progress and Accomplishments
Met representatives from the Provincial Government and Nunatsiavut Government	Under the direction of the RPA, the Regional Planner met with Ministers from both governments, members of the Nunatsiavut Government staff, Provincial Government staff, representatives from Parks Canada and other agencies. These meetings assisted in identifying sources of information and establishing appropriate levels of communications between the RPA and the governments.
Met with stakeholder groups	Under the direction of the RPA, the Regional Planner held public consultation meetings in Happy Valley-Goose Bay and the five Inuit Communities of Nain, Hopedale, Postville, Makkovik, and Rigolet. Telephone conversations and meetings were also held with representatives of the mining industry and the Labrador Inuit Development Corporation. The Planner reported back to the Authority the results of the consultations.
Collected information and mapping from government departments, agencies and the public	Under the direction of the RPA, the Regional Planner collected statistical information and undertook a literature review of material related to land use from government departments, agencies and the public. Summaries were presented and discussed at the Authority meetings. Mapping information was obtained from both governments, agencies and the public with respect to such things as mineral resources, existing uses, marine, wildlife and bird habitat, trails and archaeological sites.
Held meetings of the Authority	The Authority held three meetings and one teleconference meeting.
Identified components of the Regional Land Use Plan	The components of the Regional Land Use Plan, including goals and objectives, were identified in a working draft document.

**Objective 2**

By March 31, 2010 the Authority with the assistance of the Regional Planner will have submitted an Initial Regional Land Use Plan to the two governments for review and comments.

**Measure:** Initial Regional Land Use Plan is submitted to the two governments for review and comments.

**Indicators:**

- Held meetings of the Authority
- Prepared the Initial Regional Land Use Plan
- Consulted with the public and stakeholders on the Initial Regional Land Use Plan
- Amended the Initial Regional Land Use Plan based on comments received in the consultation process
- Submitted the Initial Regional Land Use Plan to the two governments for review and comments

**Objective 3**

By March 31, 2011 the Authority with the assistance of the Regional Planner will have considered and notified the governments of the Commissioner's report and submitted the final draft of the Land Use Plan to the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador and the Nunatsiavut Government.

## 8.0 OPPORTUNITIES AND CHALLENGES AHEAD

---

The Opportunity is for the Authority to develop a Regional Land Use Plan that reflects the aspirations and hopes of the Inuit people while adhering to the policies and directions of the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador and the Nunatsiavut Government.

The Challenge is to balance sometimes competing land use interests, and to complete and submit the Regional Land Use Plan to the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador and the Nunatsiavut Government by March 2011.

## 9.0 FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

---

The Regional Planning Authority for the Labrador Inuit Settlement Area is not required to provide audited financial statements. The Authority does not have its own funds or financial statements.

The Regional Planning Authority is jointly funded by the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador and the Nunatsiavut Government. Annual budgets are based upon the budgets established in the Implementation Plan for the Labrador Inuit Land Claims Agreement (see Appendix B).

Each government's expenditures are subject to its own internal financial administration regulations and appropriations, policies, and procedures.

## 10.0 APPENDIX A: STRATEGIC DIRECTIONS

Strategic directions are the articulation of desired physical, social or economic outcomes and normally require action by more than one government entity. These directions are generally communicated by Government through platform documents, Throne and Budget Speeches, policy documents, and other communiqués. The Transparency and Accountability Act requires departments and public bodies to take into account these strategic directions in the preparation of their performance-based plans. This action will facilitate the integration of planning practices across Government and will ensure that all entities are moving forward on key commitments.
