The Global Reality: In a Nutshell


"Globally, diarrhoea is the leading cause of illness and death, and 88 per cent of diarrhoeal deaths are due to a lack of access to sanitation facilities, together with inadequate availability of water for hygiene and unsafe drinking water." - Source: JMP













Analysis: What is the problem?

WHY are we in this current situation?

- Why are almost 1 billion people still without safe water?
- Why are 2.8 billion people without access to basic sanitation?

Current approaches aren't working.

WHY?



Why is it not working???

Four Primary Reasons:

- De-linked water from sanitation
- Lack of emphasis on the waterhealth connection
- Lack of investment in building peoples' capability to meet their own needs
- •Lack of financing mechanisms for small community driven water and sanitation programs



Basic Sanitation:


Pit Latrine

De-linked water and sanitation

- Water initiatives separate from sanitation initiatives
- Water access measured separately from sanitation access



Lack of emphasis on water-health connection



Water treatment explains almost ½ of mortality reduction in US in the first 1/3 of the 20th century

YET....

- Water & Sanitation Millennium Development Goals listed under environmental sustainability, not under human health or poverty alleviation.
- Diarrhoeal disease incidence is not used as an indicator of water quality

Vision: A world where people have the opportunity to succeed because their basic water and sanitation needs have been met.


Mission: Provide technical and consulting services and act as centre of expertise in water and sanitation for the poor in developing countries.

Differentiating Strategies


- Make water knowledge common knowledge


