Provincial Survey of Attitudes Towards Violence and Abuse

All surveys are conducted under the authority of the *Statistics Agency Act*, legislation (www.assembly.nl.ca/legislation/sr/statutes/s24.htm) introduced in 1977 that requires the information you provide be kept confidential.

The Newfoundland & Labrador Statistics Agency is the official statistical focal point for Statistics Canada (www.statcan.gc.ca/). The Agency acts as our Government's official representative on statistical issues and communicates the needs of the Province to Statistics Canada through participation in regular federal-provincial-territorial meetings.



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Introduction

The Newfoundland and Labrador Statistics Agency (NLSA) is the central point within the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador for the collection, management and distribution of economic, social, demographic and fiscal information relating to the province. The Agency is governed by the *Statistics Agency Act*, legislation that was introduced in 1977 which establishes government's authority to collect statistical information and ensures the confidentiality and privacy of all respondents. The NLSA is the Statistical Focal point for Statistics Canada (STC) and our Government's official representative to STC on statistical issues and communicates the statistical needs of the province through participation in regular Federal-Provincial-Territorial meetings.

The Women's Policy Office (WPO) is the lead department of the Violence Prevention Initiative (VPI), a six-year multi-departmental, government-community partnership to find long-term solutions to violence against those most at risk in our society. The Government of Newfoundland and Labrador supports building stronger, resilient communities with strategies and resources to prevent and reduce violence in the province.

The **Provincial Survey of Attitudes Towards Violence and Abuse** was carried out by the Newfoundland and Labrador Statistics Agency (NLSA) on behalf of the Women's Policy Office (WPO). The survey was conducted in 10 Violence Prevention Initiative regions throughout Newfoundland and Labrador under the authority of the *Statistics Agency Act*: Labrador Region, Northern Peninsula Region, Western Region, Southwestern Region, Central Region, Gander/New-Wes-Valley Region, Eastern Region, Burin Peninsula Region, Avalon East Region, Avalon West Region.

The **Provincial Survey of Attitudes Towards Violence and Abuse** was administered primarily via telephone interviews supplemented by a mail out survey. All data collection was conducted at the NLSA data collection facility.

This report is a record of all the procedures involved with the administration of the **Provincial Survey of Attitudes Towards Violence and Abuse**. Highlights of the survey results are presented in this document along with a set of summary tables.

1.0 Statement of Survey Objectives

Strategic Priority number 1 of the Violence Prevention Initiative Action Plan, *Taking Action Against Violence 2006-2012*, is to increase public awareness and attitudinal change about violence against vulnerable populations. In order to know if this priority is being met it is necessary to measure public awareness and attitudes about violence and abuse against identified VPI vulnerable populations. It is important to measure the effectiveness of VPI efforts in changing public attitudes towards violence and abuse and increasing societal knowledge in the area of violence. There is a need for evidence-based research in the area of public attitudinal change towards violence and this survey will become the benchmark for all future surveys of this nature.

2.0 Target Population

The target population was defined as all residents of Newfoundland and Labrador over the age of 18 living in private dwellings during the interviewing period. Testing of the survey occurred October 9 - 18, 2010 with the primary interviewing period occurring between October 19, 2010 and February 02, 2011. Due to budget, operational and time constraints our survey excluded those residents living in collective dwellings.

3.0 Survey Frame

The survey frame used has been developed by the NLSA for Newfoundland and Labrador and consists of all private dwellings in the province. The frame is constructed from a variety of administrative data sources containing information on dwellings (counts, location and contact information) in the province and undergoes continuous updating to ensure information is current. Statistics Canada 2006 Census counts on private dwellings for Newfoundland and Labrador was used as the point of reference in guiding the development of this frame.

4.0 Sample Design

The survey was conducted using a stratified, multi- staged probability sample design. A sample of privately occupied dwellings was selected across the province for each of the ten VPI regions. The survey was designed to achieve a confidence level of 95% with a $\pm .05$ margin of error in each of the 10 regions. The sample was then adjusted for response to determine the final sample size, n for each region.

- Firstly, the province of Newfoundland and Labrador was subdivided by the ten (10) Violence Prevention Initiative regions.
- Secondly, a listing of all private occupied dwellings, or the Primary Sampling Units (PSUs) was established for each region. A sample was chosen in proportion to the number of privately occupied dwellings of each Violence Prevention Initiative region. An urban / rural breakdown of dwellings was established for each region to help ensure that the distribution of the sample was proportional to the geographic distribution of dwellings for each region.
- Thirdly, one individual aged 18 years of age or older was chosen randomly from each household and further subdivided by male and female to ensure proportional distribution by gender. This person was the Secondary Sampling Unit (SSU).

5.0 Sample Size

The client required a confidence interval of 95% with a $\pm .05$ margin of error for each region; thus each stratum is considered an individual population and samples were developed and adjusted accordingly for each region. The total sample is outlined below including the initial and adjusted sample sizes for each region. The sample was designed based on an estimated 40% response rate.

6.0 Questionnaire Design

It is essential that survey questions are worded carefully to avoid introducing bias and to ensure it captures the information needed to meet the survey objectives. If questions are misleading or confusing the responses may be distorted reducing the reliability of the information. Several meetings took place with the WPO throughout the development process in order for NLSA staff to fully ensure the questionnaire was designed to meet the objectives of the survey and to gain perspective from the users of the data. This survey was supported by two previous surveys conducted for the VPI which allowed staff to acquire experience around the VPI and collecting information to support the initiative. The previous surveys also provided significant insight from respondents that were valuable in helping to develop an effective questionnaire for this survey. Significant focus was also placed on reducing the response burden of respondents.

The questionnaire was programmed into the NLSA's computer assisted telephone interviewing (CATI) system. Pretesting and feedback sessions with the survey unit team and the WPO helped ensure the questions were appropriate to meet the data requirements of the study and to ensure consistency of questions for all respondents. All skip patterns and screen configurations were thoroughly tested. To help with the sensitivity of the subject matter, careful attention was given to the wording and context of the questions. Prior to going into full data collection the questionnaire was pilot tested on a smaller group of respondents before the questionnaire was finalised. The questionnaire was originally estimated at 20 to 25 minutes in length, the average time to complete a survey was approximately 19 minutes.

7.0 Data Collection

The **Provincial Survey of Attitudes Towards Violence and Abuse** was primarily an interviewer, computer assisted telephone (CATI) survey supplemented by a mail out survey to dwellings that were not reachable by phone or where the respondent requested a paper copy of the survey to complete. Testing of the survey occurred between October 9 - 18, 2010 with the primary interviewing period occurring between October 19, 2010 and February 02, 2011. Some additional surveys were received through the mail after this period. All data capture was conducted at the NLSA data collection facility. Participation in the survey was voluntary. If the chosen individual was not available call-backs were scheduled when the respondent was available. Interviewers made every effort to accommodate each respondents schedule to help ensure the survey.

Interviewers are trained, and are always attentive to privacy and their duty to protect the confidentiality of information provided by respondents during the interviewing process.

Primary interviewing began Thursday 19 October at 5:00 p.m. Day shifts were between 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. and evening shifts were 5:00 p.m. – 10:00 p.m.; Saturdays 11:00 a.m. - 6:00 p.m. and Sundays 12:00 p.m. – 6:00 p.m.

7.1 Interviewer / supervisor Preparation

Interviewer preparation for a survey always begins with two separate training sessions. The first is the standard training in place for all telephone interviewers working with NLSA which is common to conducting telephone surveys in general. This training covers such topics as refusal conversion, dealing with difficult respondents, data quality, probing, interviewer bias, privacy and confidentiality, etc. Even experienced interviewers must review these topics prior to beginning a new survey.

In addition to the standard interviewer training procedures and materials already in place by the NLSA, a survey specific handbook is developed and training provided for each survey. This was also developed for the **Provincial Survey of Attitudes Towards Violence and Abuse** survey. This handbook is a detailed document outlining the intent and purpose of the survey; a description of the partners; the questionnaire; detailed briefing notes for each question; a Q/A section explaining the most common questions respondents may ask Interviewers; a detailed terminology list complete with definitions for words used in the survey; methodology topics such as how the selection of respondents will be done when conducting the survey and a detailed listing of information and resource contacts. Some of the processes NLSA used to help train the interviewers to conduct surveys are PowerPoint presentations, Q/A sessions, practical exercises (including practice on the NLSA systems in test mode), and mock interviews.

NLSA has a detailed training program covering all the topics found in the interviewers training manuals along with specific information for the supervisors.

7.2 Refusals, Delicate situations and Unable to Make Contact

NLSA interviewers were trained in refusal avoidance and refusal conversion techniques to reduce the chances of a respondent not participating. If a respondent was unable to complete a survey when contacted the opportunity to schedule the interview for a more convenient time was provided. If a respondent refused to participate the interviewer again explained the importance of participating in the survey and again offered the option to complete the survey when it was most convenient for the respondent. If this was not successful the call was assigned to a senior interviewer who had a high

degree of success in converting refusals to try and complete the interview. Interviewers recorded any relevant information regarding the call in the comments section of the interviewing software.

Interviewers were trained in assessing and addressing respondents' specific concerns /situations (such as illness or other hardships) to determine the likelihood of participating. If it was determined there was a low likelihood of completing the survey or that it would be insensitive to continue the call was terminated.

If a telephone number consistently rang 'no answer or busy' during calling, additional attempts were made during other times of the day / week to make contact. A minimum of ten attempts were made to contact each household in the sample. Answering machine messages were also left that provided a survey reference number specific to the selected dwelling. A mail out version of the survey was then sent to all unable to contact dwellings.

7.3 Quality Control

Stringent quality control standards were a high priority throughout the data collection process. The interviewers assigned to this project underwent training to ensure the consistency, accuracy and validity of all responses collected. All interviewers were also required to provide detailed case notes on all interviews conducted, ensuring that any issues or anomalies encountered were fully explained and could be reviewed by senior staff.

7.4 Quality Assurance

Every effort was made to reduce non-sampling errors in the survey. Care was given in the design of the questionnaire, training of interviewers and processing of information to reduce non-sampling errors. Quality assurance monitoring was conducted throughout the data collection process. Interviewers were debriefed daily to discuss any problems or issues encountered and provided with feedback regarding their performance where required. Monitoring staff made an effort to listen to each interviewer in the field

throughout a given shift. Interviewers that experienced quality issues were monitored more frequently. In general, there were very few quality issues, and interviewers were given a great deal of guidance in how to answer respondent's questions while still remaining objective.

Difficult respondents, problems with the comprehension of questions and difficulty in obtaining responses were discussed daily and adjustments were made to the collection procedures as deemed necessary. Overall interviewers conducted the survey in a professional and consistent manner.

7.5 Interviewer Bias

An interviewer can influence how a respondent answers the survey questions. This may occur when the interviewer is too friendly or prompts the respondent. To prevent this, interviewers were trained to remain neutral throughout the survey and to follow the script to ensure that questions were presented to all respondents in a similar manner. In addition, interviewers were provided with feedback on their progress and performance throughout the duration of this project to ensure the consistency, accuracy and validity of all responses.

Responses to all telephone interviews for the **Provincial Survey of Attitudes Towards Violence and Abuse** were entered directly into the CATI system by the Interviewers in real-time, reducing processing time and transcription errors. Questionnaires returned by mail were entered into the system by experienced interviewers trained in conducting the survey. This helped reduce the likelihood of errors from the data capture process compared to having the questionnaires entered by staff unfamiliar with the survey.

In the case of open-ended questions, answers were recorded verbatim by the Interviewers. Much emphasis was placed on quality control and Interviewer training to safeguard against potential errors.

8.0 Coding Cleaning and Editing Questionnaire

Over the data collection period, open-ended questions were extracted on a daily basis and reviewed. Responses were recoded after the collection period ended. Most responses fit into existing outcome codes for the questions, and very few new codes were created.

In cases where the response maintained a relative degree of resemblance to a pre-code, it was assigned to that code. New codes were created in instances where there were a significant number of similar responses, despite the fact that these responses did not answer the question in the exact manner desired. Codes that did not bare resemblance to a pre-code or for which no new code was created were left as: **97.00 – Other**.

9.0 Respondent Errors

Respondents can also provide incorrect answers. Faulty recollections, tendencies to exaggerate or underplay events, and inclinations to give answers that appear more ‘socially desirable’ are several reasons why a respondent may make errors in answering questions. There is no reason to believe that the majority of respondents to the **Provincial Survey of Attitudes Towards Violence and Abuse** survey did not answer correctly or truthfully.

10.0 Response Rates

The response and non-response rates for the **Provincial Survey of Attitudes Towards Violence and Abuse** were calculated at the provincial level are given below using the following definitions. Please see the response by region table below for the number of completed surveys by region and the response rates.

$$\text{Survey Response Rate} = \frac{\# \text{ of completed surveys}}{\text{Total Units Sampled}} = \frac{3987}{9315} = 43\%$$

$$\text{Survey Non-Response Rate} = \frac{\text{Total Units on Survey Frame} - \# \text{ of completed surveys}}{\text{Total Units on Survey Frame}} = \frac{9315-3987}{9315} = 57\%$$

A 40% response rate is required to achieve the desired confidence interval of 95% with a $\pm .05$ margin of error for each region.

11.0 Weighting and Estimation

The estimation of population characteristics from a survey is based on the premise that each sample unit represents, in addition to itself, a certain number of units in the population. A weight is attached to each unit in the sample to reflect this representation. The weighting process therefore allows estimations of the population to be made based on sample units. The weights are then adjusted to account for non response under the assumption that non-respondents and respondents have similar characteristics. Information from the 2006 census was used to make final adjustments to the weights.

12.0 Processing Errors

Processing errors can emerge during the preparation of the final data files. For example, errors can occur while data are being coded or edited. During the **Provincial Survey of Attitudes Towards Violence and Abuse**, these activities were closely monitored and checked to ensure that additional errors were not introduced. As the final data set was being prepared, random checks were made to ensure that the data was of the highest quality

Appendix A: Glossary of Terms

The definitions in this glossary have been provided within the context of the Provincial Survey of Attitudes Towards Violence and Abuse conducted by the NLSA for the Women's Policy Office.

Abuse *One aspect of the spectrum of violence that occurs when differences in power and equality exist between people.*

Attitude *What you think about a particular issue/topic.*

Awareness *Your level of knowledge regarding a particular topic.*

Behaviour *Manner in which you behave or act.*

Community Organizations *Not-for-profit, civil society organizations that operate at the community level. Examples include Family Resource Centres, Community Youth Networks, Boys and Girls Clubs, etc.*

Confidentiality *Protecting the confidentiality of a respondent means that information about an individual will not be made available to anyone outside the immediate survey project and results will be presented in aggregate form only.*

Cultural Abuse *When you are harmed as a result of practices condoned by your culture, religion or tradition. Examples include female circumcision, rape-marriage and sexual slavery. Honor crimes against women are tolerated in many parts of the world; women are maimed or killed for falling in love with the wrong person, seeking divorce, committing adultery or even for being raped.*

Dating Violence and Abuse *Dating violence can happen on a first date or with a regular partner at anytime within a relationship. Dating violence and abuse can have many forms physical, sexual, emotional, psychological, spiritual, cultural, verbal, financial and neglect.*

Emotional Violence and Abuse *When someone says or does something to make you feel stupid or worthless. Examples include name calling, blaming all of the problems in your relationship on you, humiliating or belittling you in front of others.*

Family *A group of people affiliated by a common ancestry, affinity or co-residence.*

Family Violence *All forms of violence, abuse and neglect that take place within the family where there are relationships of intimacy, kinship, dependency and trust.*

Financial Abuse *When someone controls your financial resources without your consent. Examples include destruction of your personal property, forcing you to work, forbidding you to have money, refusing to let you work or taking money needed to care for the family.*

Gender Equality *Is the goal of the equality of the genders or the sexes.*

Gender Inequality *Refers to the obvious or hidden disparity between individuals due to gender.*

Government *Provincial and federal government agencies and departments including the education and court system.*

Health and Community Services *The Department of Health and Community Services ensures that the people of Newfoundland and Labrador have access to services and programs enabling individuals, families and communities to achieve optimal health.*

Health Professionals *Professional people employed and providing service in the health and medical field. Examples include doctors, nurses and social workers.*

Information *Verbal or written material providing information on the prevention of violence and abuse.*

Institution *A collection of people and resources operating under a set of rules, in a set location, directed toward a common goal of fulfilling social needs.*

Internet Violence *Occurs when a person is harassed and/or abused through means of technology such as instant messaging, chat rooms, text messaging, digital cameras, web cams, websites and blogs. Posting nasty messages or pictures, spreading rumors, or tricking people into revealing information about themselves and forwarding it to others are all ways to abuse, embarrass and intimidate people.*

Male *Male human, regardless of age.*

Media *The usage of radio, television, newspapers, and/or magazines, to reach or influence people widely.*

Neglect *When someone has the responsibility to provide care or assistance for you but does not. Examples include not paying the bills or not providing medication, shelter, food or clean clothing.*

Newfoundland and Labrador Statistics Agency (NLSA) *The NLSA is the central point within Government for the collection, management and distribution of economic, social, demographic and fiscal data relating to Newfoundland and Labrador. The Agency is governed by legislation introduced in 1977. The NLSA is the official Statistical Focal Point for Statistics Canada.*

Offender *An individual who has inflicted any type of violent or abusive act towards another individual.*

Personal Care Home *A licensed for-profit private facility in which care is provided to five or more adults.*

Physical Violence and Abuse *When someone uses a part of their body or an object to control your actions. Examples include pushing, shoving, pinning or holding a person down, slapping, kicking, assault with a weapon; the extreme is murder.*

Prevention *To stop all violent and or abusive acts against individuals in society.*

Privacy *It is the ability of an individual or group to keep their lives and personal affairs out of public view, or to control the flow of information about them. Privacy is the ability of an individual or organization to reveal oneself selectively. Privacy is sometimes related to anonymity although it is often most highly valued by people who are publicly known. Privacy can be seen as an aspect of security — one in which trade-offs between the interests of one group and another can become particularly clear.*

Public Awareness Campaign *An organized, systematic effort through various communications media to alert the general population of a given area to anything of significant interest or concern.*

Published Materials *Written materials printed for providing information to the general public, for example newspapers, magazines and brochures.*

Psychological Violence and Abuse *When someone uses threats and causes fear in you to gain control. Examples include threatening harm to you, your children or your family if you leave, or when an individual threatens to harm themselves.*

RCMP *Royal Canadian Mounted Police*

Reach Out. Take Action Against Violence *Slogan of the Violence Prevention Initiative, Government of Newfoundland and Labrador.*

Respondent *The person being interviewed.*

RNC *Royal Newfoundland Constabulary*

Safe Home *Temporary accommodations in communities where transition houses do not exist. A safe home may be a rental apartment, private home or hotel unit.*

Second-Stage Housing *Help women who have left abusive relationships make long-term plans for independent living.*

Services *Any place, organization or person a woman who is a victim of male violence and /or abuse can access for help.*

Sex *Biological and physical differences between men and women.*

Sexual Violence and Abuse *When someone forces you to take part in sexual activity when you do not want to. Examples include touching you in a sexual manner against your will, or forcing you to perform sexual acts that you find degrading or painful.*

Slogan *A memorable motto or phrase used as a repetitive expression of an idea or purpose.*

Society *All members of the community combined, for example individuals, government, media.*

Spiritual Violence and Abuse *When someone uses your religious or spiritual beliefs to manipulate, dominate, or control you. Examples include when someone tries to prevent you from practicing your religious or spiritual beliefs, making fun of your beliefs, forcing you to raise your children in another religion or spiritual choice, and using these beliefs to control you.*

Spiritual/Faith-Based Groups *Faith-based organizations play an active role in serving members of their faith and supporting their communities. Regardless of their cause, these*

organizations strive to create stewardship, not just through financial support but also through volunteer work and other community involvement.

Statistics Agency Act Legislation introduced in 1977 that enables the NLSA to collect, manage and disseminate economic, social, demographic and fiscal data relating to Newfoundland and Labrador. All employees of the NLSA are sworn in under the act and once done so have a legal obligation to ensure the confidentiality of all information at all times.

Transition House Provides temporary housing in a safe, secure environment for women and their children leaving abusive relationships.

Verbal Abuse When someone uses language, whether spoken or written, to cause you harm. Criticism, cursing, name calling, insults, recalling your past mistakes, expressing negative expectations, yelling, and expressing distrust are all are forms of verbal abuse.

Victim An individual who has been abused in any form by another individual.

Violence Improper treatment of a person that causes harm and violates the rights of that person.

Violence Prevention Initiative (VPI) The VPI of the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador reflects government's commitment to addressing the problem of violence in this province. The Initiative is a six year, multi-departmental, government-community partnership to find long-term solutions to the problem of violence against those most at risk in our society - women, children, seniors, persons with disabilities and other vulnerable people who are victims of violence because of their race, ethnicity, sexual orientation or economic status.

Visible Minority A person identified as visible minority in Canada is someone (other than an Aboriginal person) who is non-white in colour or race, regardless of place of birth.

Woman Female human, regardless of age.

Women's Organizations Organizations which primarily serve women. Generally, they are not-for profit, civil society organizations that operate at the community level, such as Women's Centres. However, they may also be provincial in scope, such as the Multicultural Women's Organization of NL, or even have a provincially legislated mandate, such as the Provincial Advisory Council on the Status of Women.

Women's Policy Office (WPO) *The WPO is the central agency within the Government of Newfoundland and Labrador which coordinates the development of programs and policies for the benefit of women in the province.*

Women's Shelter *A place of temporary refuge and support for women escaping violent situations, such as rape, and domestic violence.*

Workplace *A person's place of employment.*

Workplace Violence and Abuse *Any form of harassment, violence or abuse of any nature experienced in your place of work by a superior, co-worker or subordinate.*

Purpose

The Newfoundland and Labrador Statistics Agency (NLSA) is conducting a survey on behalf of the Women's Policy Office (WPO) to measure public awareness and attitudes towards violence and abuse in the province. The information collected will help improve the provincial government's violence prevention efforts throughout Newfoundland and Labrador.

Confidentiality

Although participation in this survey is voluntary, your co-operation is important to ensure that the information collected is as accurate and as comprehensive as possible.

The survey will only take 10 to 15 minutes to complete, and your answers will be kept strictly confidential as required by the *Statistics Agency Act*. No identifying information will be presented.
