

People are Concerned About the Budgetary Shortfall

Of those surveyed:


- 44.8 per cent - very concerned

- 40.3 per cent - somewhat concerned

that there will be in excess of \$1 billion less to spend on programs and services for next year's budget

68.6% Identified one or more options for increased taxation

When asked about options for increased taxation, 68.6 per cent of respondents selected one or more of the options provided, 27.7 per cent thought Government should not increase taxes, and 3.7 per cent said they didn't know.




How comfortable were people with borrowing?

55.4%

Of those surveyed:

- 8.4 per cent were very comfortable
- 47.0 per cent were somewhat comfortable
- 16.6 per cent not at all comfortable

- 24.3 per cent - were not very comfortable with borrowing to offset the budget shortfall.




People were asked if government were to reduce the size of the public service to help deal with the budget shortfall, which approach they felt would be the best option.

The survey was carried out by the Newfoundland and Labrador Statistics Agency (NLSA) of the Economics and Statistics Branch of the Department of Finance under the authority of the Newfoundland and Labrador Statistics Agency Act which provides the legal authority to collect the data and guarantees privacy regarding individual responses.

A random, probability based sample of 404 respondents was used and the results are accurate within $\pm 4.9\%$, 19 times out of 20 (95% confidence level).
