


YTD OCTOBER HIGHLIGHTS

- Provincial tourism performance continued to improve through October across a range of indicators. The number of non-resident air and auto visitors to NL reached 353,730 from January to October, a 127% increase compared to the same period in 2021. While auto visits have recovered to surpass 2019 levels (+18%), air visitation (-27%) has been slower to recover, leaving overall year-todate non-resident visitation 17% below prepandemic 2019 levels.
- Auto visitation has been strong over the first ten months of 2022 at 76% above the same period in 2021 and 18% above 2019 levels. Marine Atlantic passenger movements and passenger-related vehicle movements have also surpassed 2019 levels over this period. Despite posting strong growth compared to 2021 (+158%), visits by air have been slower to recover, reaching 73% of 2019 levels for the January to October 2022 period.
- The licenced accommodations sector continued to recover, with the occupancy rate (+15.1 pts), room nights sold (+41%) and total room revenue (+70%) all up for the January to September period compared to the same period in 2021. Room nights sold have recovered to 99% of 2019 levels, while total room revenue was 8% higher than during the same period in 2019. The occupancy rate from January to September was 3.7 points above where it stood during the same period in 2019 and the average daily rate stands 9% above where it was during this period in 2019.



Ferry Passenger Movements: Marine Atlantic passenger movements (both directions) reached 327,807 YTD October 2022, an increase of 66% compared to the same period in 2021 (197,802) and up 14% from 2019 (286,755).

- Passenger-related vehicle (PRV) movements increased 69% during the same period, from 77,052 to 129,885. PRV movements YTD October were up 18% from pre-pandemic 2019 levels. The number of crossings increased from 1,414 to 1,529, up 8% from the same period in 2021 and 9% from 2019.
- Passenger movements for the month of **October 2022** (25,615) were up 10% over October 2021 (23,378), and 8% above October 2019 levels (23,648). The number of PRV movements in October 2022 (10,633) increased 7% compared to October 2021 (9,976) and increased 7% compared to October 2019 (9,897).
- Auto Visitors: The number of non-resident automobile visitors to the province is estimated to have reached 104,665 year-to-date October 2022, an increase of 76% over the same period in 2021 and 18% higher than during the same period in 2019. For the month of October 2022, auto visitation was 5% below October 2021 levels but 7% above October 2019 levels.

MARINE ATLANTIC PASSENGER MOVEMENTS & AUTO VISITATION


Newfoundland and Labrador Non-resident Auto Visitors 2019 to 2022


- Air Passenger Movements: Airport activity (boarding and deplaning passenger movements) for St. John's, Gander, Deer Lake, St. Anthony, Goose Bay and Wabush reached 1,447,095 passenger movements from January to October 2022, an increase of 115% compared to the same period in 2021 and have recovered to 74% of 2019 levels. Passenger movements for the month of October 2022 were up 48% over October 2021 and have recovered to 86% of October 2019 levels.
- Air Visitors: The number of non-resident air visitors to the province reached an estimated 249,065 yearto-date, up 158% from the same period in 2021 and recovered to 73% of 2019 levels. For the month of October 2022, non-resident air visitors increased 59% compared to September of last year, and recovered to 80% of October 2019 levels.
- Seat Capacity: With travel restrictions easing since the second half of 2021, seat capacity has been rebuilding and air services have been recovering from the severe cuts during the COVID-19 pandemic. Inbound non-stop seat capacity to NL (7 major airports) has been benefiting from these improvements, with monthly capacity increasing every month compared to the same month in the previous year since May 2021. The January to October 2022 period saw an increase of 134% in inbound seats compared to the same period in 2021 (818,308 seats versus 349,539 seats in 2021) but remains 19% below 2019 levels (1,008,357 seats).
- As capacity continues to build, the monthly number of inbound seats is approaching pre-pandemic levels, with October 2022 (90,694 seats) just 6% below the October 2019 capacity (96,150 seats).

Newfoundland and Labrador Non-resident Air Visitors 2019 to 2022




- Room Nights Sold: From January to September 2022, licenced accommodations in the province reported 1,104,175 room nights sold, an increase of 41% from the same period in 2021. Year-to-date room night sales have recovered to 99% of 2019 levels.
- Occupancy: Accommodation occupancy reached 51.5% for the period from January to September 2022, an increase of 15.1 points compared to the same period in 2021 (36.5%). The occupancy rate YTD September 2022 was 3.7 points above the prepandemic 2019 rate for the same period.
- Room Revenue: Total room revenue reached \$169.3 million from January to September 2022, up from \$99.8 million for same period in 2021, an increase of 70%. YTD room revenue has recovered to surpass pre-pandemic 2019 levels (+8%).
- Year-Over-Year (YOY) Growth: For the month of September 2022, room nights sold increased 15% over September 2021, from 140,357 to 160,974. Room night sales in September 2022 were 3% above September 2019 levels. Total room revenue for the month of September 2022 was \$26.9 million, up from \$19.9 million in September 2021, representing an increase of 35%. Room revenues for the month of September 2022 were 17% higher than those recorded in September 2019. September occupancy reached 64.7%, an increase of 10.2 points over September 2021 and 8.3 points higher than in September 2019.



NL Licenced Accommodation Occupancy Rate 2019 to 2022




 Average Daily Rate (ADR): The ADR reached \$153 for the period January to September, up 20% from the same period in 2021 (\$128), and up 9% from where it stood in 2019 (\$140).

- The ADR for the month of September reached \$167, up 18% from September 2021 (\$142) and 14% above the September 2019 rate (\$147).
- Note: all accommodations data are preliminary and subject to change pending further reporting by operators.

Important Notes:

Short-term rental activity reports performance indicators for the province of Newfoundland and Labrador for accommodations that are listed on and booked through the short-term rental platforms Airbnb and Vrbo as reported by AirDNA. Performance is reported for listings which had at least one day classified as available or reserved during the reporting period. A *listing* can be any type of property, including entire homes, apartments, studios, cabins, vacation homes, tents, campers/RVs, individual hotel suites or rooms, B&Bs, and other types. Listings can comprise one room or multiple rooms that are rented as one unit.

Airbnb/Vrbo listings include licenced accommodations as many operators use these platforms as channels to market their properties. Statistics for licenced properties (e.g. nights available, nights booked, occupancy rate) are also included in the "Accommodations" section above.

*Average daily rates are reported in \$US and converted to \$C using the Bank of Canada monthly average exchange rates.


- Short-term Rental Listings: According to AirDNA reporting, there were 2,508 listings in the province on the Airbnb and Vrbo short-term rental platforms in October 2022. This compares to 1,928 listings in October 2021 (+30%). Of these, 2,073 listings (83% of total listings) had at least one reservation during the month of October 2022. This compares to 1,610 booked listings (84%) in October 2021.
- Nights Available: For the period January to October 2022, short-term rental properties in the province listed on Airbnb and Vrbo reported 503,944 nights available for bookings/reservations compared to 343,502 nights available for the same period in 2021 (+47%).
- Nights Booked: From January to October 2022, shortterm rental properties in the province reported 283,997 room nights booked, an increase of 65% compared to the same period in 2021 (172,510).
- Occupancy: The occupancy rate for short-term rental properties in the province reached 56.4% for the period January to October 2022, an increase of 6.1 points compared to the same period in 2021. The average daily rate* reached \$197 for the period January to October 2022, an increase of 9% compared to the same period in 2021 (\$181).



Background Tourism Performance 2017 – 2021

- The number of non-resident air, automobile and cruise visitors travelling to the province reached an estimated 181,305 in 2021, an increase of 57% compared to 2020, but down 66% from 2019. Total in-province expenditures by nonresidents are preliminarily estimated at \$114.8 million, an increase of 65% compared to 2020 but 61% below 2019 levels.
- The number of non-resident air visitors travelling to the province reached an estimated 116,634 in 2021, an increase of 51% compared to 2020, but down 69% from 2019. In-province expenditures by non-resident air visitors are preliminarily estimated at \$138.3 million, an increase of 57% compared to 2020, down 68% from 2019.
- Non-resident automobile visitation to the province reached an estimated 64,671 visitors in 2021, an increase of 68% compared to 2020, remaining 31% below 2019 visit levels. Inprovince expenditures by non-resident auto visitors are preliminarily estimated at \$76.5 million, increasing 81% compared to 2020 but 28% down from 2019.

The Tourism Research Division, Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts and Recreation is responsible for the maintenance of a travel/tourism data base that permits the monitoring of various statistical indicators. This is achieved through the co-operation of many industry stakeholders and department staff who provide data to the division on a regular basis. This summary could not be prepared without them. This comprehensive travel and tourism database includes as its primary indicators counts of marine and air passenger movements (including estimates of non-resident visitors) at the major entry/exit points in the province. Secondary indicators include performance measures/visitation statistics for numerous facilities and sites in the province as well as the collection of detailed operating statistics for the province's accommodation sector (availability, sales, occupancy and related revenues for all registered operators).
